THE YEAR AT A GLANCE

While demand for services grew, the COVID Funds offered by the City and other funders was decreased in 2022. Fortunately members of the community were able to step in to help the bring the total funds up. Food Security continued to be a major focus, and the number of Individuals visiting either the Food bank or meal program grew more than 20% over the year before. We also continued to support children and youth programs run by our partner agen-

cies with snacks and meals. We implemented our Environment Champion program which encouraged visitors to bring reusable containers for their meals. This resulted in a huge cost saving, and is better for the environment. The computer Café saw more visitors as we received a donation of great computer chairs. Members of the community continued to donate a wide range of new and gently used items for the depot and clothing assistance program.




FINANCIALS



Grants Fundraising Donations Capital Funds

Revenue from grants decreased by 7.4%, but a successful public appeal for funds brought in at additional 6.5% in donations to offset the decrease. To meet increased demand, the centre was able to raise 28% more than in 2021, increasing total revenue to \$1,222,220 from \$955,715 the year before.

Expenses can in just slightly higher than funds raised, leaving a small deficit for the year of 2.4% of the total budget.

FOOD SECURITY PROGRAMS

The food security programs offered by the Family Centre include the food bank; healthy breakfasts and lunches each weekday; snacks for kids after school; and Christmas Hampers.

None of these programs would be possible without the help of our community partners including the Ottawa Food Bank, Salvation Army, Giant Tiger, and all of our supporters listed on page 10 of this report. The Ottawa Food Bank increased the amount of food they deliver to the Family Centre to assist us in providing services to the people who rely on these programs.

The Caldwell Food Bank has been the topic of much discussion lately. In 2022 we provided 56,447 grocery food boxes, which is a 68% increase over 2021, and a 180% increase over 2019 - before the pandemic. To facilitate this increase, the basements and first floors of both housing units 20 and 22 at 1100 Medford have been completely taken over by the food bank, with offices remaining on the second floor.

Thanks for the Great Meal!

2,100 meals were provided to the City of Ottawa run day camps, and 1,290 meals provided to the after school program run at Bellevue by our partner, Carlington Community Health Centre. Parents have told us that one of the reason they enroll their children in the after school program is because they will receive a full meal. In March of this year we started providing meals to the SWAG program run by the Community Health Centre, which has in turn increase enrollment in that program. SWAG stands for Students Will All Graduate, so increased enrollment means more students finishing high school.

In addition to the full meals served to the kids at Bellevue, last year we provided 26,227 snacks to the programs at Alexander Community Centre, and the Carlington Rec. Centre (the gym) on Caldwell Ave.

Besides the meals that are served at Bellevue and either eaten in or taken out, we send meals to the Hampton Court apartments for seniors, Lepage Manor, Golden Manor, and 1290 Coldrey - all OCH properties.



In the kitchen at Bellevue, both Chef David, who started in late 2021, and Chef Chris who started in early 2022 had a busy year. Working with their teams of staff and volunteers they prepared and served 94,448 meals.

ENVIRONMENT CHAMPION PROGRAM

During the pandemic we were paying over \$5,000 a month for disposable takeout food containers. In 2022 we introduced the Environment Champion Program. Everyone taking out a meal was provided with a reusable container, and if they brought the container back clean and ready to receive more food, they received a ticket for a weekly gift card draw. Those who eat in the Drop-in using washable plates are also eligible to receive the draw tickets. Although we still need to purchase disposable takeout containers for the offsite meals, and folks who are unsheltered with nowhere to wash their containers, this program has saved us thousands of dollars, and has decreased the amount of garbage.

Computer Cafe

At the computer cafe in Bellevue clients find help with writing their resume, and online job search. They can also participate in mock interviews and choose clothes for the Clothing Depot to help them land the job.

17 people used these resources to find jobs in 2022.

Additionally, many clients use the computer café for a wide range of reasons. These can include doing taxes, completing government forms, contacting family and friends, complete homework assignments, or keeping up to date on what's happing in the world and their communities. It also helps provide some normality to clients who may have lost access to the internet after previously using it a lot.

Clients can also print from this location and take advantage of many other resources offered, including the staff or volunteer who is on standby for any technical support they may need.

At 3 pm the adult programs close so that the kids after school programs can take over the building, and the computers are there for homework.

DROP-IN

The Drop-In is open from 8am to 3pm every week day, and helps alleviate social isolation. The coffee is always on. We installed a public phone that is used over 200 times a week. A small library with books of interest to both children and adults is permanently in place

The Drop-In area is also a space where people can eat their breakfast and lunch provided by our meal program. This is especially important for the folks who are unsheltered.

This space is also used to host community events like BIN-GO, to not only build community but give clients an opportunity to win some fun prises!



NEW HOT COUNTER



To help in the kitchen, we managed to obtain grants to purchase new kitchen equipment, including a new hot counter, making meal service faster and more efficient. Our thanks to the City of Ottawa, Ottawa Community Foundation, and Ontario Trillium Foundation for their help in feeding families in need. And of course, thanks to Ottawa Community Housing for allowing us to upgrade the kitchen space.

BACKPACK PROGRAM

We closed the computer cafe for a couple of days to give out backpacks, school supplies, and shoes. The kids and parents enjoy being able to choose the items they want for back to school.

213 kids were well prepared to head back in September. We also close the Computer Cafe to pack the Christmas Food Hampers. We helped 593 families during the holiday season in 2022. We also provided 300 turkey dinners for the community holiday meal.

THE FOOD BANK PROGRAM

The food bank, operating out of 1100 Medford St, provided hundreds with volunteer opportunities. There is always something to do. Every Monday the food bank receives a delivery from the Ottawa Food Bank, which is unloaded and stored away by volunteers. At the same time, volunteers help with "Food Rescue", where food that has minor flaws but is still safe to eat is picked up by volunteers. This food would otherwise be wasted. Volunteers remove and sort through the rescued food and remove any parts that have imperfections so that it is safe to eat. This not only helps limit food waste, but provides more families with fresh food.

Our foodbank is run with choices for the clients. When they come in, they can pick from a selection of brands or types of food to not only provide some much needed feelings of control to people living in stressful situations, but also helps with any dietary restrictions clients may have. Volunteers also prepare food boxes for delivery, for any community members who may not be able to make it to the foodbank for health or disability related reasons.

Additionally, twice a month the Caldwell centre offers a mobile foodbank to travel to communities who are wither unable to travel to our location or has a very large number of individuals in need of this service.



CLOTHING ASSISTANCE

The Clothing Depot is a place where customers can purchase clothing, toys and household items at deeply discounted prices. This social enterprise provides opportunity for youth to gain work experience and Newcomers to receive a Canadian reference to help secure gainful employment. It also helps to fund the Clothing Assistance Program. In 2022 This program was open once a week on Thursdays.

In addition to the Depot, clothing assistance is also offered from this location. Families referred by other social service organizations receive free clothing, footwear, and household items, due to ongoing need, or an emergency like a fire, or having to flee an abusive situation. Delivery is available to families who are unable to travel to the Caldwell Family Centre for pickup.



SCHOLARSHIPS

Each year the Yolaine Münter and Caldwell Family Centre scholarships of \$1,000 each are awarded to students who have shown the most improvement during their high school career. They can be used for college, university, or trades training. This year's winners are:
