### Message from Paula Klein, Board Chair

2023 was a year of significant change in leadership for the Centre. Our long-time Executive Director, Marilyn Matheson, decided it was time for her to make a career change. Susan Hopkinson served for five months as acting Executive Director while the board undertook a search for a permanent replacement. Susan did an outstanding job in challenging circumstances, and we are very grateful for her dedication.

We were delighted when Eugene Williams agreed to join the Caldwell Family Centre in December as our new Executive Director. Eugene has over 30 years of leadership experience in the Non-Profit sector. His enthusiasm, dedication to CFC, and impact in the past 6 months are already evident.

The Caldwell Family Centre could not have accomplished what we did in the last year without the support of our many community partners, donors, sponsors and the dedication of our volunteers and staff. ### Message from Eugene Wiliams, Executive Director

In 2023 we were challenged to find sufficient funds to pay frontline staff needed to meet the increased demand for the food bank and other community programs. In response, the Caldwell Family Centre received a 12-month grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation to build its resilience and sustainability by hiring a Director of Development and Communications to increase our capacity to raise funds and generate income through social enterprise activities.

Optimism can sometimes be challenging in times like these, but still, this year has brought a renewed sense of positivity. One source of optimism is our partnership with Nutrition Blocs, which has enhanced our ability to address the food security needs of low-income residents in Ottawa. This partnership enabled us to collaborate with multiple community partners to prepare meals that supported uniquely delivered food programming and culturally appropriate meals for seniors, children and the unhoused.

Our community members rely on CFC and our partners to fill the gaps left by inadequate income to access food, housing, mental health support, and other basic needs. Our staff and volunteers rise to this challenge daily. At the same time, CFC advocates at local and provincial levels for public policies that address the root causes of poverty, such as guaranteed annual income.

### No One Goes Hungry – Focus on Food Insecurity

Food insecurity is the inability to acquire or consume food or the uncertainty that one will be able to do so. CFC has extensive experience in delivering food security programs. They include a large food bank, healthy breakfasts and lunches served daily, snacks for kids after school, and Holiday Hampers. Our food security programs were supported by the City of Ottawa, the Ottawa Food Bank, individual and corporate donations, and local food service companies.

### **Program Highlights - Community Service Hub**

Our Drop-In Centre location at 1475 Caldwell Avenue is a community service hub that provides clients with one-stop access to a wide range of services. This includes food security, community programming, and wrap-around services, which help low-income clients reduce social isolation, remain healthy, and stay connected to their community.

In addition, CFC worked with multiple service providers, including Community Mental Health Nurse, City of Ottawa ESS Workers, and Ottawa Public Health Services, who came on-site to deliver social service and community programs. The Drop-in Centre is also the location of our After School and Employment Readiness Program.

### Computer Café

Our Computer Café is well used to obtain help for various purposes, including updating resumes and providing job search support. In addition, clients completed income taxes, submitted government forms, printed important documents, completed homework,

connected with family members, and stayed informed about world and community news. Staff and volunteers are available to provide technical/computer support.

### Clothing Depot

The Clothing Depot is where customers can purchase clothing, toys, and household items at deeply discounted prices. This social enterprise provides an opportunity for clients, including youth and newcomers to Canada, to gain work experience and receive a reference to help secure gainful employment. Families experiencing high need are referred to the Clothing Assistance Program, receiving free clothing, footwear, and household items.

## Drop-In

The Drop-In Centre aims to reduce social isolation and help connect clients to their community. Coffee is free of charge, and clients can access a cafeteria-like setting where breakfast and lunch are served in our meal program. In addition, they have access to a public telephone, television, and a small library.

Grants were received last year from the City of Ottawa, the Ottawa Food Bank, the Ontario Trillium Foundation and the Canadian Red Cross. The total grant funding received in 2022 included a variety of COVID-relief specific subsidies that are no longer available. CFC was fortunate that the increase in our fundraising compensated for the loss of revenue from grants. We ended the fiscal year with a budget surplus of \$761.00.
